

After setting up a doorbell camera when some packages had gone missing, Louise also put cameras in her bedroom and home office. It was an idea that had come to her when her husband Michael\* started to become violent and she realised the footage might come in useful.

However, Louise could never have imagined that he would take over the household technology and use it as another way to terrify her.

Known as 'tech abuse'; there are a growing numbers of cases where perpetrators have been caught using technology to control, harass or intimidate their victims. They hack phones, cyberstalk their victims and use social media, cameras, or other kinds of technology as means of control.



#### Are you being stalked online?

Stalkerware typically runs in the background without the affected individual noticing. To avoid the risk of someone installing stalkerware on your phone, it's important to avoid leaving the device unlocked and use a complex lock screen password. You should also:

- Check the list of applications on your device to see if unknown programs have been installed without your consent
- Consider buying a new phone for private communications, if you can afford it
- Don't rush to remove any stalkerware found on your device, as the abuser may notice and it will remove evidence that you are being stalked. It is very important to consider whether the perpetrator may be a potential risk to your physical safety before determining appropriate action to take
- Contact local authorities and service organisations that support victims of domestic violence to gain assistance and help with safety planning.





**Gaslighting** is a colloquialism, loosely defined as making someone question their own reality.<sup>[1][2]</sup>

The term may also be used to describe a person (a "gaslighter") who presents a false narrative to another group or person which leads them to doubt their perceptions and become misled (generally for the gaslighter's own benefit), disoriented or distressed. Generally, this dynamic is possible only when the audience is vulnerable, such as in unequal power relationships, or when the audience is fearful of the losses associated with challenging the false narrative. **Save the evidence**: Because gaslighting can make you question yourself, work on preserving evidence of your experiences. Keep a journal, save text conversations, or keep emails so that you can look back on them later and remind yourself that you shouldn't doubt or question yourself.



## 'Silent AirTags' With Speakers Removed Pop Up on Etsy, eBay


Silent AirTag listings and online guides say silencing the speakers prevents thieves from finding them on stolen items, but privacy advocates have stalking concerns.

#### How to Find/Spot a Silent AirTag Tracking you?

Finding or spotting a hidden AirTag can be tricky if it is silent. If you are an iPhone user, you simply need to keep an eye on your device and see if it reports a notification of a mysterious AirTag following you.

However, if you are an Android user, you might end up having a tough time. Apple provides a free Android app known as **Tracker Detect** that can help you scan for such privacy-intruding AirTags. But, you'll have to manually do the scan every time you feel suspicious or leave a public place.

There is another free Android app known as **AirGuard**. The Academic Researchers in Germany have developed it. This app can scan for AirTags continually, and will report it to you once it finds one. However, you can't use the app to disable it.

Although the simplest way to find or spot an anonymous AirTag is to keep a check on your things, especially your car (and under it) using your eyes.

#### How to Protect yourself from Silent AirTags?

If you ever find an anonymous AirTag on or around your stuff, you can disable it wireless using your iPhone or iPad, only if the OS version is 15.2 or higher. To do that, go to the "Find My" app. Go to the "Items" tab and then tap on "Items that can track me."

From there, tap on the "Unknown Items" prompt to scan for nearby AirTags and other Find My-compatible tracking devices. When any device is detected, you can choose the option to turn off tracking.



After that, you can find the AirTag, pull it off, twist its cover, and remove its battery. Later, you should also report the incident to the local police. However, if you are an Android user, you'll have to do everything manually.

# 'I have moments of shame I can't control': the lives ruined by explicit 'collector culture'

The swapping, collating and posting of nude images of women without their consent is on the rise. But unlike revenge porn, it is not a crime. Now survivors are demanding a change in the law

uby will never forget the first time she clicked on the database AnonIB. It is a so-called "revenge porn" site and in January 2020, a friend had texted her for help. Ruby is a secondary school teacher, used to supporting teenagers, and her friend turned to her for advice when she discovered her images were on the site.

"She didn't send the thread that she was on," says Ruby, 29. "She was embarrassed, so she sent a general link to the site itself." When Ruby opened it, "I couldn't believe what I was seeing. I couldn't believe that such an infrastructure existed: something so well organised, so systematic, fed by the people who lived around us."

AnonIB was categorised by country - the US has the most entries, the UK is next - but then broken down by region, city and local area. "And when I say 'local', it wouldn't be 'London' or 'Birmingham', a city of any size would have smaller, specific categories, like 'Birmingham University students'," says Ruby. The thread for Ruby's town (population 55,000) stretched to 16 pages and with each intimate image of women and girls, there were comments with as much identifying information as possible by local users - names, surnames, the schools they had attended, who their relatives were. There were also lots of "requests" for pictures of certain women - often called "wins" ("Any wins on XXXX?" "There must be more of this slut out there." "I can now look her boyfriend in the eye knowing I've seen his missus naked.")
